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
Purpose

- StoryMap with interactive charts





Planning for a Changing Population

2020 - 2024




Total Households

2020 - 2024




Household Size


Average Travel Time




Navigating Persistent Housing Strains

Total housing units and residential units built have been increasing:






Housing Cost Burden




Age of Housing Stock









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



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


Key Content

Responsibilities

- Meet at least 7 times through Winter 2028
- Recommendations and reports back to PCs



Next Steps

- Stakeholder engagement and early public outreach to inform emerging issues for plan cycle
- Pending action of JPC and Regional Council
 - June EAC Retreat: Appoint members to RTP/SCS Subcommittee
 - July: First meeting of Subcommittee
- Adopt Policy Development Framework in October 2026

Recommended Action for JPC

- Recommend that the Regional Council establish a special Regional Transportation Plan/Sustainable Communities Strategy (RTP/SCS) Subcommittee to provide overarching policy leadership for Connect SoCal 2050.

Local Data Exchange (LDX): A Local Input Process for Connect SoCal

- **What is LDX?**

- Through the LDX, SCAG aims to meet and exchange local information for regional purposes with all Southern California Jurisdictions.

- **Why LDX is used?**


- A key purpose is to support SCAG in meeting the requirement to “set forth a forecasted development pattern for the region.” The LDX is also the primary opportunity for local jurisdictions to provide input into the development of Connect SoCal, ensuring that the data are accurate and consistent across the region.

- **How LDX works?**

- SCAG prepares jurisdiction-specific GIS data and maps and a survey. SCAG aims to meet one-on-one with local jurisdictions to discuss the data and plan development. For Connect SoCal 2050, meetings will begin in April 2026 and input is due to SCAG by November 20, 2026.

Statutory Requirement on *Forecasted Regional Development Pattern (FRDP)*

- Government Code 65080(b)(2)(B) et seq. requires that SCAG:

"set forth a forecasted development pattern for the region, which, when integrated with the transportation network, and other transportation measures and policies, will reduce the greenhouse gas emissions from automobiles and light trucks to achieve, if there is a feasible way to do so, the greenhouse gas emission reduction targets approved by the state board and will allow the regional transportation plan to comply with Section 176 of the federal Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C Sec. 706)."

Proposed LDX and FRDP Guiding Principles recommended by CEHD on 3/5/26 for RC adoption

- LDX provides a process for SCAG staff to work with local jurisdictions on technical inputs to Connect SoCal 2050 and to generate a forecasted regional development that will be:
 1. **Rooted in local planning policies.** The forecasted regional development pattern will use local general plans as a starting point, or ceiling, for growth and local jurisdictions will be asked to update and review the development pattern with their expertise of local planning context and pending/upcoming planning work.
 2. **Aligned with state policy.** The forecasted regional development pattern will reflect the housing element process and be assessed against SCAG's SB 375 greenhouse gas emission reduction targets.
 3. **Steered by a regional vision.** The forecasted regional development pattern will further focus growth in areas supported by Regional Planning Policies adopted by the SCAG Regional Council and follow regional and county forecast totals as guided by SCAG's Demographic Panel of Experts.

Preliminary Data/Maps for Connect SoCal 2050

- Six categories of data/maps:
 - Local jurisdictions may update/correct data that fall within local purview
 - Additional regional data provided as a reference
- LDX serves as a two-way information exchange process to provide *transparency* into regional plan development process as well as *data*, *resources*, and *tools*.
